# Japan's Book Donation to the University of Louvain

Did you know that one of the greatest but most forgotten cultural common heritages of <u>KU Leuven</u> and <u>UCLouvain</u> Belgium is the 1920s Japanese book collection? This collection is among the most remarkable and systematic collections of premodern Japanese books outside of Japan.

It consists of almost 3,200 Japanese titles comprising about 14,000 volumes, along with several maps and works of arts and was part of the international effort which was launched to rebuild the library of the University of Louvain destroyed in 1914 during the First World War. Since then, the old University of Louvain, founded in 1425, split into two separate major universities, KU Leuven and UCLouvain who together cherish this joint heritage and now have major plans with it.

This academic event will shed light on the historical background of this spectacular donation with two presentations by Prof. Dr. Naraoka Sōchi (Kyoto University) and Prof. Dr. Jan Schmidt (KU Leuven) and contextualize the content of this book donation with a third presentation by Prof. Sasaki Takahiro (Keio University). Prof. Naraoka, eminent historian of foreign policy and diplomacy of Japan, will introduce the importance of the Paris Peace Conference in 1919 for the Belgian-Japanese relations and Prof. Schmidt will explain the process leading to the actual donation as part of cultural diplomacy, while Professor Sasaki will compare the donated books with other prominent collections outside of Japan to emphasize the immense – and hitherto unrealized – potential and value of the donation.

A selection of the books is currently on display in the special exhibition "Japan's Book Donation to the University of Louvain". Japanese Cultural Identity and Modernity in the 1920s", curated by Prof. Schmidt, in collaboration by the KU Leuven Libraries and UCLouvain. The exhibition also highlights Japanese society and culture in the 1920s in the context of global modernity, through film clips, photographic material and objects. It also includes a number of unique loans from the National Museum of Japanese History, the Ohara Institute for Social Research and the National Film Archive of Japan, which will be **on display in Europe for the first time ever.**
